President Report 2017/2018

AGM 2018 Message from Donna Burke, President

This has been a very memorable and pivotal year in the life of Reach Child and Youth Development Society. I refer, of course, to the opening of our beautiful new facility in the heart of our community — the Lois E. Jackson Kinsmen Centre for Children. Our Board of Directors, the Foundation Board, all our managers and staff are so proud and grateful for the tremendous community support that went in to making this dream a reality.

Moving forward, our Society and our Foundation Boards will be working with funders and donors to double the number of children Reach supports over time. In addition, our Board will be moving forward providing services to people with developmental disabilities who are over the age of 19. Our focus will be on gaps in services with a priority of extending programs to support young folks transitioning to adult services. We will work with community living organizations and move towards supporting these young adults so their talents and skills are not wasted and they can lead lives of fulfilment.

This is a good time to pay tribute to the people who work with Reach—the people who manage and run the Reach operation and the people who work with our clients. The former hires employees, pays the bills, attends multiple meetings with stakeholders and government to advocate for funding and ensure Reach is always current. The "front office" includes human resources, finance, fundraising, communications, event planning and volunteer recruitment and engagement. Our Board works closely with these people. We are very impressed by their creativity and innovative approaches. They work extremely hard to support the organization and move it forward.

From time to time the Boards of Directors for the Society and the Foundation invite clinical staff members to our meetings to tell us specifics about their programs — the people they help, the level of needs, the evaluation processes, establishment of goals, strategies implemented, the level of collaboration needed to support a child with special needs

Reach Child and Youth Development Society EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT 2017-2018 Heartfelt Appreciation

It has been an exciting year for Reach Child and Youth Development Society (REACH). After 8 years of fundraising and one year of construction in December we moved into our new child development centre, the Lois E. Jackson Kinsmen Centre for Children, located in the heart of Ladner. Our hearts are over filled with appreciation to the REACH Foundation and for the breadth of community support that made this landmark achievement possible.

We are also celebrating the close of our *Building for Children Together* Campaign as the fundraising for this new centre is near completion and are in the midst of making plans to improve and develop other facilities and to expand our programs and services to families.

Our capital campaign has been the focal point of Reach's strategic directions for approximately eight years and having achieved this goal the Society and Foundation's focus is shifting towards expanding programs and addressing other facility needs.

While our Foundation concentrated on completing our campaign and on the construction of our new centre REACH Society Board and staff have continued to work in partnership with the Ministry for Children and Family Development, school districts and our many community partners to provide family centered services within our existing programs and resource base.

Some of our many program achievements over the year include:

- A total of 1,015 children and youth benefited through an improved quality of life in all of our 15 programs totaled together this year.
- 4205 volunteer hours were contributed by Reach Directors, FINDS and program and events volunteers.
- 570 family visits were made to our Infant Development Program's Playgroup within the 80 drop-in sessions offered in both North and South Delta.
- Reach's DeltaKids Early Years' Centre, (EYC) increased access to information and resources related to child-development and continued to expand its reach exponentially with:
 - Information distributed to 23 different early years programs and at community events to approximately 900 families
 - 8 Pop- up Play sessions in partnership with Delta libraries with 40 families participating
 - 44 Mom and Tot Meet Up sessions in partnership with Child Care Resources and Referral and Delta Libraries with 160 families attending
 - I session of Parents as Talking Teachers in partnership with Fraser Health with 12 families benefitting

- Our ABA autism program and the Infant Development Program received training and
 participated in the UBC coordinated PACE (Parent and Child Early Coaching Project) to
 help implement and evaluate an evidence based parent coaching intervention (based on
 the Naturalistic Behavioral Intervention model for children aged 15 to 30 months who are
 at risk for autism spectrum disorder (ASD).
- Our Infant Development and Supported Child Development Programs once again cofacilitated the Down Syndrome Support Group, meeting monthly for the sixth consecutive year.
- REACH Developmental Preschool South's registration significantly increased for typically developing children after years of struggling enrolment within our new community based location.
- The Aboriginal Supported Child Development (ASCD) Program in partnership with our Supported Child Development Program (SCD) offered monthly sessions of intensive and targeted training to help daycares handle children's challenging behaviors. ASCD also partnered with the Fraser Region Aboriginal Services to offer local events including a "Back to School Barbeque" where children received free backpacks filled with school supplies.
- Our Early Intervention Program's speech therapists developed a reoccurring 6 week
 parent education series for families of children involved in the autism program. The
 occupational therapists also developed and ran a toileting group and a fine motor
 development group. The physiotherapists organized in house orthotic clinics so families
 did not have to travel distances to receive support.
- The Delta Connex Program (supporting children and youth who have a confirmed or suspected diagnosis of FASD (or a similar neurodevelopmental condition) was able to reduce its three year waitlist down to one year using one time funding from the Ministry for Children and Family Development and funds generated at the REACH gala.
- The Positive Connections and Connex Program Manager developed a new program called Choices, a pay for service program for behavior support and workshops. This program shows significant potential for future growth.
- The Positive Behavior Support Program's Punjabi Speaking Parent Support Group is now
 entering its fourth year helping to address access barriers and helping these families
 connect with each other and build their own support networks.
- Program Assistants were introduced in the Positive Behavior Support Program, the Supported Child Development Program and our Early Intervention Therapies Program significantly increasing efficiency in these programs and freeing up other program staff to focus more directly on supporting families.
- The Respite Program worked together with the Positive Behavior Support Program, at the
 request of the Ministry to provide a wraparound comprehensive integrated series of
 supports for a child at risk of going into care. This initiative also provides an opportunity
 for future program development for REACH.

- FINDS Children's Exchange also relocated to the new REACH centre and as a result increased sales by 22% in the last two months of the fiscal year compared to the preceding 10 months of sales.
- REACH marketing and communications actively promoted REACH programs, and fundraising:
 - After years in the making launched REACH's new website providing a more user friendly navigation process and an effective interface with REACH fundraising activities
 - REACH appeared in local press 29 times over the last year including a multiple page insert in the Delta Optimist commemorating our Grand Opening of the Lois E.
 Jackson Kinsmen Centre for Children
 - REACH Facebook page likes increased to 1,124 and Twitter followers' total 1,152
 using consistently positive and informative posts pertinent to children with needs and
 their families and
 - Our Gift of Speech Annual Holiday Appeal raised a total \$18,095, representing a 69% increase over the previous year.
- The format for REACH's popular Parent Network Information Exchange was updated and upgraded to tie into REACH's new website and provide a user friendly interface for families.
- New software introduced to REACH's specialized library now enables families and community members to view online the unique books and resources available for loan.

Never an organization to stand still for long Reach set the stage for a planning process between the Society, the Foundation and REACH staff to update our strategic plan and priorities and focus the organization on growth and development in programs and other facilities. A summary of the updated strategic directions will be available at REACH's AGM.

As we mobilize and move forward I would like to take this opportunity to thank our team members: our Society Board of Directors for their leadership and commitment, our Foundation Board of Directors for their determination and incredible fundraising success, our dedicated FINDS, program and event volunteers, and our amazing Reach management and staff team whose front line work has made such a difference to families.

Heartfelt appreciation is extended to the Kinsmen Club of Ladner and Tsawwassen, Mayor Lois Jackson, the Corporation of Delta and especially Councilor Sylvia Bishop our Municipal Liaison, the backbone of our capital campaign who together with the provincial government, businesses and community members provide us with the funding and resources needed to help our children and youth reach their potential.

Our REACH team of volunteers, staff and community supporters have many successes to celebrate, most importantly that we were able to help strengthen families and improve the quality of life for over 1,000 children and for this I am most grateful and offer my heartfelt appreciation to all involved!

Treasurer's Report For year ending March 31, 2018

Treasurer's Report for Year Ending March 31, 2018

Reach Child and Youth Development Society is financially strong with \$1,228,700 in net assets. This provides us with a cushion of just over two months operating expenses reserve in case of need.

Included in current liabilities are \$599,459 in deferred revenues representing funds received in the current year for expenditures that will be spent in the subsequent year. Part of these totals is Gaming Grants of \$227,162. Current liabilities represent payables of \$6,003 covering payroll liabilities and \$649,094 covering employee's vacation, mileage and wages, social fund and trades payables.

Financial Highlights for the Past Year:

- Total revenue increased \$1,312,348 to \$7,274,278.
- 2. Grants from the Ministry for Children and Families totaled \$6,841,297 or 94% of total revenue.
- 3. Total cash of \$841,792 increased by \$292,155 from prior year.
- 4. Total Revenue deficiency expenses in the amount of \$46,632.
- 5. Salaries, benefits total \$4,149,861 or 57% of Total Expenses.

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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Directors of Reach Child and Youth Development Society

Report on the Financial Statements

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Reach Child and Youth Development Society, which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2018, statement of changes in net assets, the statement of operations, schedule of operations, and the statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for notfor-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit. I conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the

An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified audit opinion.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many charitable organizations, Reach Child and Youth Development Society derives a part of its revenue from donations, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, my verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of Reach Child and Youth Development Society, and I was not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to donation revenue, excess of revenue over expenses, assets and net assets.

Qualified Opinion

In my opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Reach Child and Youth Development Society as at March 31, 2018 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations

Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

As required the BC Societies Act, I report that, in my opinion, the accounting principles Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profits organizations have been applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

1. PURPOSE OF THE SOCIETY

The stated objectives of Reach Child and Youth Development Society ("the Society") are as follows:

- A. To promote the education, training, development and welfare of children with special needs and typically developing children.
- B. To cooperate with public and private agencies, governmental departments and other groups and organizations interested in the projects of the Society.
- C. To develop a better understanding by the general public regarding children with special needs and typically developing children.

The Society is incorporated under the Society Act of British Columbia as a not-for-profit organization and is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act, and as such is exempt from income taxes and is able to issue donation receipts for income tax purposes. In order to maintain its status as a registered charity under the Act, the Society must meet certain requirements within the Act. In the opinion of management, these requirements have been met.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A. Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO).

B. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash consists of cash on deposit with banks and highly liquid short term interest bearing securities with maturities of three months or less.

C. Capital Assets

Capital assets are recorded at cost. The cost for contributed capital assets is considered to be fair value at the date of contribution.

Amortization is provided using the following methods at rates intended to amortize the cost of assets over their estimated useful lives.

D. Deferred Contribution Related to Capital Assets

Contributions related to depreciable capital assets are deferred and amortized on the same basis as the related tangible capital assets.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

E. Revenue Recognition

The Society follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions.

Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred.

Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Donations are recognized on a cash basis rather than on an accrual basis.

Gaming revenue is recognized in the year in which the related expenses are incurred.

F. Donated Goods and Services

The Society benefits from donated supplies and services, however gifts and services in-kind are not recognized in the financial statements. A total of 2,899 volunteer hours (1,456 in 2017) were contributed to the Society for this fiscal year. When a fair value can be determined for donated supplies, an income tax receipt is issued to the donor

G. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the reporting date and the reported amounts of receipts and disbursements for the reporting period. Actual results could differ from these estimates. Significant financial statement items that require the use of estimates are as follows: amount of accrued liabilities, and the useful life of capital assets. These estimates are reviewed periodically and adjustments are made, as appropriate, in the statement of operations and changes in fund balances in the year they become known.

H. Term Deposits

Term deposit are recorded at their cost plus accrued interest.

I. Fund Accounting

In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Society, the accounts are maintained on a fund accounting basis. Accordingly, resources are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds. These funds are held in accordance with the objectives specified by the contributors or in accordance with the directives issued by the Board of Directors.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

I. Fund Accounting - continued

Two funds are maintained - Administration and Programs Fund and Gaming Fund.

The Administration and Programs Fund reports the program activities of the Society.

The Gaming Fund is used to account for the use of gaming funds in accordance with the BC Gaming Policy and Enforcement Branch.

J. Impairment of Long-Lived Assets

Long-lived assets are reviewed for impairment when events and circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of a long-lived asset is not recoverable and exceeds its fair value. The amount of the impairment loss, if any, is the excess of carrying value over its fair value.

3. TERM DEPOSITS

The term deposits are held at the Envision Credit Union. The investments are highly liquid term deposit that are readily convertible to cash.

5. BUILDING PROJECT

In May 2010, the directors voted to work towards construction of a building to house the Reach Child and Youth Development Society operations ("the building project"). All donations for this project were collected through the Reach Child and Youth Development Charitable Foundation.

6. DEFERRED CONTRIBUTION

Deferred contributions represents restricted contributions that have been used to acquire tangible capital assets. These deferred contributions are amortized on the same basis as the related assets. A total of \$5,472,143 was raised and used to construct the South Delta building, which was completed in this fiscal year. The deferred contribution and the cost of the building will be amortized over the 30 year lease, that is in place with the City of Delta for the land where the building resides. The minimal rent equal to a dollar is due to the City annually.

9. DEFERRED REVENUE

10. DUE FROM RELATED PARTY

As defined by ASNPO, the Society is related to The Reach Child and Youth Development Charitable Foundation by way of both a common board member and the Executive Director.

The amounts due to the Reach Child and Youth Development Charitable Foundation ("Foundation") are non-interest bearing and have no fixed terms for repayment. The two parties are related in that the Foundation's primary duty is to receive, hold, and invest funds and property and to administer and distribute these funds as needed to support the programs and activities of the Society.

11. INTERNALLY RESTRICTED NET ASSETS

This is a contingency reserve fund for future employee sick leave. The society's policy is to grant sick credits of 1.5 days per month of employment to a maximum of 54 days for full-time employees. Accumulated sick time shall not be paid out at the time of termination.

12. TRANSFER

In June 2018, the Board of Directors approved the motion to forgive \$125,000 of the due from the Foundation in order to offset the net deficit in the Foundation.

13. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Society is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments. These risks include credit risk, investment risk, interest rate risk, and liquidity risk. The following analysis presents the Society's exposure to significant risk at March 31, 2018.

The Society does not use any derivative financial instruments to mitigate these risks.

Credit risk

The Society is exposed to credit risk with respect to the amounts receivable and term deposits. These amounts receivable were received soon after the year end and term deposits are invested with large financial institutions

Interest rate risk

The Society is exposed to interest rate risk with respect to the following financial instruments: cash and cash equivalents, and investments in interest bearing securities. Changes in interest rates can affect the fair value of investments and the cash flows related to interest income and expense.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk exposure is dependent on the receipt of funds from government grants, and other sources of income to enable the Society to pay its liabilities as they become due.

14. ECONOMIC DEPENDENCE

The Society is economically dependent on government funding and independent grants, which represent 98.64% (2017 - 98.13%) of the total revenue.

15. CAPITAL MANAGEMENT

The Society's objective when managing capital is to safeguard the entity's ability to continue as a going concern, so that it can continue to provide services to the community.

The Society sets the amount of capital in proportion to risk and manages the capital structure and makes adjustments to it in light of changes to economic conditions and the risk characteristics of the underlying assets.

16. SOCIETIES ACT OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

As part of the new disclosure requirements of the B.C. Societies Act, the Society reports they had 6 employees who earned in excess of \$75,000. Total remuneration to these employees for the calendar year 2017 was \$519,932.
